Encouraging Reading...

At Llandeilo Primary School in Carmarthenshire, dogs **Riley** and **Leila** recently enjoyed a star-spangled celebrity reception. Together with their handlers **Leanne McFarland** and **Susan Smith** of Carmarthenshire Therapy Dogs, they strutted their stuff on the catwalk (dogwalk?) to the sound of *Hound Dog* and then demonstrated to pupils how much they loved to listen to people reading—and to children's stories in particular!

The event marked the launch of Reading with Dogs in Carmarthenshire, a collaboration between Carmarthenshire Therapy Dogs and Volunteering Matters' pan-Wales project Learn Together Cymru. Learn Together Cymru Project Co-ordinator **Rebekah Sharpe** explained, "Although most of our volunteers are human—and we are always keen to recruit more research has shown that reading to dogs can also be immensely valuable in promoting a child's love of reading and their reading skills. For some children, reading to a dog can be a real boost to confidence: the dogs are always pleased to have the attention and they never criticize!" Susan Smith from Carmarthenshire Therapy Dogs explained that both the volun-

teers and their dogs go through a selection



and training process to ensure that both are suitable for being in school. She is keen to hear from more dog owners who think that their pets have the temperament to join the project.

After the launch event, Head Teacher **Karen Towns**, who was the first Head in Wales to request a *Reading with Dogs* volunteer, will be distributing leaflets to request that volunteers – with or without dogs – come forward to listen regularly to as many of the children as possible.

Over the years, Jack has used his skills and experience to help hundreds of older people with maintenance jobs in their own homes.

The volunteer handyperson service in Stirling and Clackmannanshire provides support for older people with everyday tasks including rewiring plugs, fitting batteries in smoke alarms, assembling flat pack furniture and putting up shelves. This service helps older

people to live independently in their own homes. Thousands of older people have benefited over the past decade and the group are



also looking for new volunteers to help them expand

further. Jack said: "I started as a volunteer handyperson in 2005 and I find it a lot of fun. It means a lot to me that I can use my skills and experience to help older people who struggle with these things in their own homes. It also gives me the opportunity to keep active in retirement."

Project coordinator **John Brown** said: "We have a fantastic team of dedicated volunteers who complete hundreds of handy jobs each year—we simply wouldn't be able to operate without them. Jack deserves a huge deal of credit. He has made a massive contribution to our project."

Citywise Celebrates

Volunteering Matters CEO **Oonagh Aitken**, Chair **Anne Heal** and several trustees were delighted to help *Citywise* celebrate over two years of excellent

achievement at their recent get-together. Citywise is a pan-London Lottery funded project for older volunteers covering a wide variety of schemes across the

capital, and Oonagh introduced the celebration by talking about the vital importance of volunteering to the whole community and the commitment and diligence of the volunteers in Citywise.

From supporting Latin-American

From supporting Latin-American prisoners to reading in schools, from supporting Iranian refugees to working in a community garden, the *Citywise* umbrella covers quite a range of activities. Volunteers representing many of the schemes spoke about their activi-

ties, their pleasure in volunteering and the value and impact they felt their volunteering activities contributed to the community. It was an engaging and illuminating day.

Lindsey, who is part of the Employability Programme undertaken in conjunction with DeLoitte, spoke

about her need to find work following unemployment and how Citywise opened her eyes to future possibilities. "For me, engagement was the key. People fascinate me and I realised I can give something back and that was my starting point." Lindsey began helping with reading in a primary school, then went on to pilot a guide to London Living for people whose first language wasn't English, and then started

the *Citywise* Media Project building a case study database of volunteers and their work. In a short span of time, said Lindsey, "Citywise made me aware of unexplored opportunities, they guided and encouraged me such that I met different people and learnt a lot from the different projects."

Lisa, who was a beneficiary of the Befriending Project,



spoke movingly about how volunteers contacted her and gave vital support at a crucial time in her life when she was low, isolated and

afflicted by mental health problems. Gradually, by being able to talk to our volunteers including Winifred, Lisa was able to move forward with her life. "This has had an enormous impact on me – my mental health has improved as a result of being able to talk through my problems with another person. I can now talk openly, make better choices – and I now have more self- confidence which has helped me to try new things such as speaking in public." These

are just two of the many powerful stories we heard. Anne closed the proceedings by presenting volunteer awards, and spoke about how moved she was to hear the stories told by the volunteer representatives. "It was a truly inspiring morning," said Anne. "Hearing from both the volunteers and some of the people they

have been working with shows just what a difference volunteering of all sorts can make. The impact of older volunteers in the communities they support is immensely valuable - and the volunteers also were able to tell us what tremendous benefit they personally got from the experience. I was so proud to be there and meet so many people who are doing such great things."

NEW BEST PRACTICE GUIDES FOR CARE HOME STAFF

A free tool to improve the lives of older people living in care homes, *Making a Difference*, has been produced by UK organisation *Alive*! in partnership with Bristol City Council and **RSVP West.** Positive relationships between residents, staff and relatives are at the heart of good care and care home management has a vital role to play in nurturing the positive interactions which lead to close relationships.

Making a Difference consists of two guides, one for care home managers and one for care staff. The guides are designed to provide simple, practical ideas to ensure that developing strong relationships with residents is a top priority for care homes. The guide for care staff offers pragmatic suggestions for engaging with residents and getting to know them when undertaking their care work. To make sure they're fit for purpose, the guides were developed in conjunction with care managers and staff and can be used as part of an induction session as well as a resource for ongoing training.

Simon Bernstein, CEO of Alive!, says, "As well as offering an outstanding range of person-centred activities through our own presenters and training care staff to deliver high quality activity sessions themselves, we are dedicated to improving the lives of older people in care by championing their access to purposeful activity and intellectual, social and emotional engagement. Our policy is to share best practice with all who can benefit. RSVP's team of Lay Assessors will also be using the guides with care homes, as part of their work alongside Bristol City Council's Quality Assurance Officers, to support and promote the importance of quality of life for residents."

Mike Hennessey, Bristol City Council's Service Director for Adult Social Care, said: "Bristol City Council works with hundreds of organisations providing care and support to our citizens every day. Our ambition is to be a caring city and a great place to grow old. We are continually looking at how we can better support our ageing population. Alive! and RSVP, with the Council, have produced this new guide which is a good example of partnership working to improve

quality of care across the city, as strengthening relationships between care home staff and the people they look after will have many mutual benefits. I hope these new free training resources will be helpful for all providers working to treat people as individuals, with their own stories, preferences and value which is absolutely essential to high quality care."

Founded in 2009, *Alive*! has grown rapidly to become one of the leading practitioners in the UK of meaningful engagement for older people in care, and *Alive*!'s training courses empower care staff to deliver person -centred activities themselves.

Sporting Chance Award

In the last edition we directed you to the wonderful video made by Sporting Chance—the group set up in Middlesbrough which runs men's activities to improve physical health and mental well being, as well as to reduce social isolation.

The great news is that the group has now been awarded £30,000 from Stockton and Hartlepool Councils and North Tees Clinical Commissioning Group—who fund innovative projects to reduce hospital admission, and improve people's health and well being leading to reduced GP appointments—in order to do a pilot in Stockton. 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Brexit and us

These are extracts from Oonagh's message about the referendum vote and the likely impact on Volunteering Matters:

I thought that it would be a good moment to talk to you about what I believe this decision will mean for our charity.

One thing is really clear; nothing is going to change for us in the short term......We know that negotiations cannot start until Article 50 of the Lisbon Treaty is invoked. We have seen some movement in markets and currency but things may well settle down.However, we witnessed a toxic and divisive campaign. We saw communities and families divided. Longer term, we may find further cuts to public services. Since the referendum, there have been reports of racist incidents and there are intergenerational tensions resulting from a perception that the older generation voted to leave while younger voters wanted to remain.

What does all this mean for us?

As you all know, we have a European team, working on a range of projects and supporting our European network, Volonteurope. Their work is supported by an operating grant from the European Commission and we have an assurance that this grant will be honoured until 2018 at least. Our project funding is also secure. Our full time volunteering programme receives many volunteers from the EU through the European Volunteer Service. We hope that young people will still be able to come to the UK through this route.

I believe there are challenges to this referendum decision for charities but opportunities as well. The response of civil society organisations like ours should be to try to help to heal some of the divisions in communities. Our work is more essential than ever. We believe that community cohesion can be supported by volunteering. Our volunteers work with some of the most vulnerable people in society and in some of the poorest communities. We must ensure that these people are not left behind if there is a downturn in economic circumstances.......We can offer so many, increasingly vital, services for young people, disabled people families and older and retired people.

Our trustees, while concerned overall about the decision to leave the EU, are optimistic and confident about the future of our charity.

I'd like to thank you for your hard work now, and ahead, as we continue to strengthen our organisation and make sure that the people that need our services most receive them.
