Care Home Lay Assessors Scheme

At our last meeting with Bristol City Council in early June they asked RSVP West to restart the lay assessor service in care homes.

We were delighted, as we have long worried about the problems care homes must be facing with post pandemic issues and staff shortage, and the effect these matters must have on the quality of life of the residents.

However, because of staffing shortages in the Quality and Contracts team we work with in the council, most of our future visits will not be with council staff. The council will write to the care homes we are about to visit saying we will be visiting on their behalf and reporting back to them. The Quality and Contracts team will then send a report to the care home which will include our views, and concerns if there are any, and ask the care home to reply saying what action they are taking to address the issues raised.

Our fantastic volunteers are keen to try out this new way of working for they feel strongly about the need for the council to hear the voices of residents. It remains to be seen how much notice care homes take of the views of volunteers and we aim to re-visit care homes after a three month period to see if they have acted on any promised improvements.

Musical Activities

The good news is that we are slowly inching towards restarting our musical activity sessions. Despite restrictions being eased, resuming our sessions in care homes and extra care sites is complicated. With the help and support of Bristol City Council and Public Health, who both recognise the importance of running these sessions, we are working on making the sessions as safe as possible for our volunteers, the residents and staff.

The very nature of these group activities which include singing, using musical instruments, balloons, ostrich feathers and chair based exercises, means that some things will need to be done differently and some we will have to lose as being too risky, i.e. the balloons and the feathers. Our volunteers and the groups have really missed these sessions and are keen to get back. Inevitably, some of our volunteers have now moved on to different volunteering roles or family priorities have taken precedence. Two and a half years is a long time since the sessions were last run.

We look forward to the challenges ahead and to bringing back some fun and activities for the residents and volunteers to enjoy.

Viewpoint of a Home Care Lay Assessor

In 2019 I started volunteering for RSVP as a Care Homes Lay Assessor and then COVID struck, so when there was an opportunity to volunteer as a Home Care Lay Assessor I decided to give it a go.

What immediately strikes me is that people who receive Home Care are really isolated and sometimes very lonely, so that if their experience of Home Care is poor it has a significant impact on their day to day quality of life. Some of the service users I've spoken to have been angry and frustrated because they don't have the capacity to change their situation. Of course the flip side to that is if they get

a good service, in addition to getting the practical help they need, they feel respected and have some genuine companionship however brief.

I feel this is very different from care home residents, where at least there are other people around all the time – both residents and staff – so whilst loneliness and isolation are obviously still an issue, it's not as acute as for those living in their own homes.

It hadn't occurred to me before volunteering that for some the Home Care visits provide respite for the live-in relations of service users – often sons or daughters who have to care for their parents 24/7, and for whom the Home Care service gives a brief window when they can leave the house and have some independence.

So far I've been very impressed with Bristol City Council's response to our reports – it's clear that they really value the work which we're doing, and that it provides significant help for them when carrying out their quality assessment of different service providers.

I can't say the work is enjoyable, but it's eyeopening and thought provoking, so I hope to continue.
