## Amanda Naylor and Natasha John—visit to RSVP West

On a sunny (if breezy!) July day we welcomed Amanda Naylor OBE, the Chief Executive Officer of our parent organisation Volunteering Matters (VM), to Bristol. Amanda's visit was part of her "getting to know you" tour of RSVPs around the country during her first year in the role. Amanda was accompanied by Natasha John, VM Head of Volunteering and Engagement.

Their visit was a great opportunity to showcase some of the RSVP West volunteering projects of which we are rightly proud. We started at the Create Centre, a vibrant environment centre that hosts a range of events and exhibitions, housed in an old warehouse near the Cumberland Basin, owned and managed by Bristol City Council, where RSVP West has based its office space for the last 30 years.

Amanda and Natasha first met our Regional Management Group (Judy Harris, School Volunteer Organiser; Jan Snook and Paula Johnson, Care Assessor Organisers; Hilary Roberts, Office Coordinator; and me, Surgery Volunteers Organiser). We were very pleased to welcome Amanda to Bristol and meet her face to face for the first time; and of course to see Natasha again, whom we already know well and whose support we have valued over the years.

Over refreshments, we shared information about RSVP West's 30 year history, and our ongoing projects; and heard about VM's current and future plans.

Amanda and Natasha then met some of our Surgery Volunteers in the Create Centre Café. A group of our Volunteer Drivers and Befrienders from different GP surgeries talked enthusiastically about the friendships they have made as volunteers, which have far exceeded the expectations of both beneficiaries and volunteers. Amanda and Natasha seemed moved by volunteers' stories, and the volunteers greatly appreciated the interest they showed.

Then it was time to move on to our next venue, and a long-anticipated visit to The Matthew at Bristol Harbourside, a modern reconstruction of the original ship that John Cabot sailed to Newfoundland in 1497.

## **Care Home Lay Assessor Scheme**

## We are delighted to report that the Care Home Lay Assessor (LA) scheme is restarting.

Set up in 2014 and led by Ken Dolbear & Jan Snook, the scheme involves volunteer Lay Assessors, visiting Bristol City Council's care homes to provide an independent assessment of residents' quality of life. These assessments contribute to BCC's own monitoring and inspection visits.

Sadly, visits to care homes had to stop during the pandemic and restarting the scheme has been difficult. However, intensive efforts by Jan, Ken, Paula Johnson (the Home Care LA scheme Organiser) and Ruth Hecht (a previous volunteer LA), in discussions with BCC, have successfully revived the scheme under the leadership of Ian Tennant & Pat Taylor who have been appointed as joint Organisers. Both Ian and Pat have a background in social work, between them clocking up an impressive ~ 80 years of experience in a wide range of roles including management, teaching and research in this area.

Some of the previous RSVP LAs have agreed to return to the scheme, and recruitment of more LAs to join the team is being planned. BCC remains committed to the scheme and RSVP is grateful for their continued funding.

Pat and Ian have been involved in a range of volunteering activities since their retirement. Pat represented community issues to a local hospital trust for 6 years and she chaired the governing body of a community run swimming pool. She joins RSVP West this year. Ian was an RSVP West Organiser from 2008-2012, leading the Reading in Schools and GP Surgery Schemes. He writes "I have always been convinced of the immense value of volunteers and I am glad to play a part in the revival of the RSVP Care Home Lay Assessor scheme."

### **Schools**

#### Neurodiversity Workshop, Bristol – 19 September

In September, a group of approximately 30 RSVP Schools Volunteers from the Bristol and Bath area spent a very useful afternoon training together. We gained a far better understanding of the different types of neurodiversity we might come across in children whilst volunteering in our schools. In addition we were given helpful tips towards how we can adapt our reading and other teaching support styles to best suit these neurodiverse children.

The training was conducted in a friendly interactive workshop format. The first speaker Alison Knapman, a specialist dyslexia teacher at a local secondary school, started by giving us an invaluable on-the-ground insight into how overwhelming a mainstream class environment can be for a neurodiverse child. This involved subjecting us to a timed test with rapid and detailed multiple instructions, contradictory messages and an extreme time pressure – we certainly all felt very overwhelmed by the experience and most of us failed to complete it at all!

Alison then proceeded to explain how this type of experience can be especially negative and demotivating for a neurodiverse child and then gave us some really useful ideas to help ensure that our interactions are not like this but instead are a positive experience.

The second speaker, Alison Boulton, a neurodiversity expert with 40 years experience, complemented the first session by explaining more of the scientific background to neurodiversity, from the types of characteristics that might be observed, to gender variations and how they present. She also gave some very useful pointers for TV documentaries to watch and books to read to further our knowledge.

The overall afternoon was extremely informative and also gave us the opportunity in the tea break to meet and share volunteering experiences with other RSVP volunteers which is always very enjoyable.
